WRAP YOUR RING.- basic tutorial & guide.

There are various ways to cover your ring for macramé if you so wish.

- 1. You can leave it in its natural colour gold, silver, etc.
- 2. You can spray paint to your colour palette.
- 3. Or you can wrap the ring. There are a variety of ways to wrap the ring.


A. Wrap 1.

Take the single long length as stated in the pattern and leave a tail (as per measurements in pattern), fold at that point.


- i. with the longer length facing right, create a single LH.
- ii. Take the longer length and pull under the ring (blue arrow), through the loop and then over the ring (purple arrow), creating a loop.
- iii. Now take the longer length and bring it over cord (pink arrow), through the loop and then under the cord (orange arrow).
- iv. Pull the length tight (plum arrow).
- v. And this is what the first wrap looks like, continue to the end.
- vi. The two ends from the wrap is used as part of the knots. Add the rest of the lengths.



B. Wrap 2. — I have used crochet cotton for this example. (The patterns will state the amount of cords and you will take all the cords and fold in half and then wrap as per points i to ii.)
i. Take your 18 lengths and fold in half. I mark the centre point, by tying it with string.
ii. Take the single long length, fold it in half create a single LH, take the cords, create a loop over your lengths (blue arrow) and bring your cord under and through the loop (purple arrow).
iii. Pull the cord tight and repeat Step ii. 10 times
iv. Fold in half again.



Create a gathering knot. See tutorial below.



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
